I'll be meeting with the unions to protect essential city services, and to avoid layoffs where possible, but cooperation by the unions is essential if we are to protect their jobs. The bottom line is that a give and take attitude is essential to survive this economic crisis. The old ways of doing business are over and a new mindset is crucial in running city government.

I'm proud of the great strides we made together in my first term in office, but there's still work to be done. I'm humbled by the confidence you've placed in me, and pledge to continue a common sense direction for our future.
